A look back at 2012 and a peek forward to 2013



Janus (the Roman god after whom January was named) had two faces, one looked forwards, the other looked back - like the reflections we sometimes enjoy around new year time.

2012: Some weird and whacky inventions were dreamt up in 2012 - some more useful than others:

A "mute" button for noisy people. Ever dreamed of having a remote control to shut someone up? Have you ever been in a phone conversation and some glitch in the system has meant you hear your own voice echoed back to you, its annoying and almost impossible to carry on talking - This problem became the inspiration for a novel idea by the Japanese inventors Kazutaka Kurihara and Koji Tsukada. They have developed a device that stops people speaking - it echoes

back a person's speech after a slight delay and apparently works over distances of up to 30metres!

An off button for children? Ideal for the classroom of the future maybe!

Gloves that can talk? Sign language is used by many people who can't speak. What if their hands could talk back? Ukrainian students have developed gloves with electronic sensors that convert sign language into speech via a smartphone. The device, called EnableTalk, only costs £50 to make and has the potential to cheaply transform the lives of 40million deaf and mute people around the world.





Indoor clouds. Cloud gazing is a fine way to pass time. But the only problem was that, until recently, it could only be done outdoors. Luckily, Dutchman Berndnaut Smilde, has found a way to control the weather. Using a fog machine at the right temperature and with the correct amount of light, he can isolate fluffy white clouds in our living rooms. A solution to a problem we've all been having? Perhaps not!

So... what about NEXT year?

What new inventions might be unveiled to solve every-day problems?

What new and imaginative solutions might YOU come up with?

Inventions almost always arise from problems, and people looking for new ways to overcome difficulties. Looking for possible new solutions, kind of connects with the ideas from the "It couldn't be done" poem. I wonder what we will come up with over the next 12 months?


