## Positive steps for pupils' independence in conflict resolution.

Conflicts may arise from misunderstandings, and cause unintentional upset. What we do at these times can either escalate the problem into an argument and falling out of friends, or gently resolve the problem and prevent it arising in the future. Clearly, resolving the problem and preventing it happening again is the best choice of actions.



To encourage children to be able to do this for themselves, when something happens or is said that children don't like or upsets them, we encourage them politely to say "Please don't do that

- I don't like it". This enables the other person to see their point of view "Sorry, I only meant it as a joke" or "I was only playing" etc... It also empowers the person who feels upset to make a difference themselves; gives the other person a chance to apologise and stop whatever is upsetting. It also makes clear what is the "Right Thing" to do (School Rule - Do the Right Thing!). In the unlikely event that the actions continue, then adults can be told, and that they had been asked to stop!

"Please don't do that - I don't like it" is a gentle, polite request that is well understood across the school as a serious signal that whatever is happening should stop straight away.

# Some facts and figures behind some of the improvements at Shanklin.

Attendance so far has improved and is now above the National average.

Numbers of pupils with absence of greater than 15% has reduced by 56% and 20% absence has reduced by 71% compared with the same period last year.

Unauthorised absence has reduced from 2.6% down to 1%; Detentions have reduced to zero Fixed term exclusions are on track to reduce by over 80% this year

Quality of lessons observed 40% have been Good or better (with none inadequate)

The class with the best attendance for week ending 16 November 2012 was Poland Class with 99.2% Well done to Poland Class.

Holland Class 98.6%, Austria Class 95.2%, Greece Class 94.6%, Germany Class 97.8%, Sweden Class 96.7%, Poland Class 99.2%, Italy Class 95.9% and Portugal Class 87.6%
